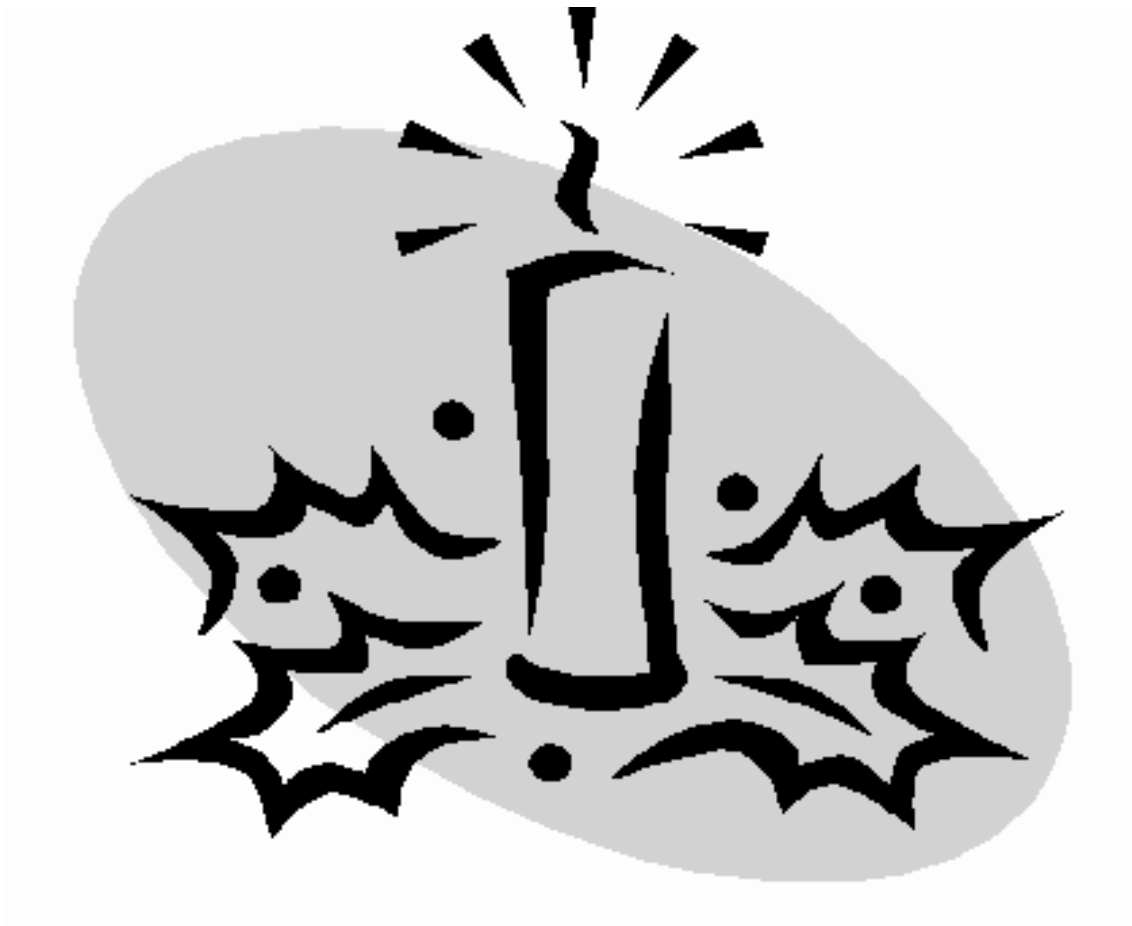



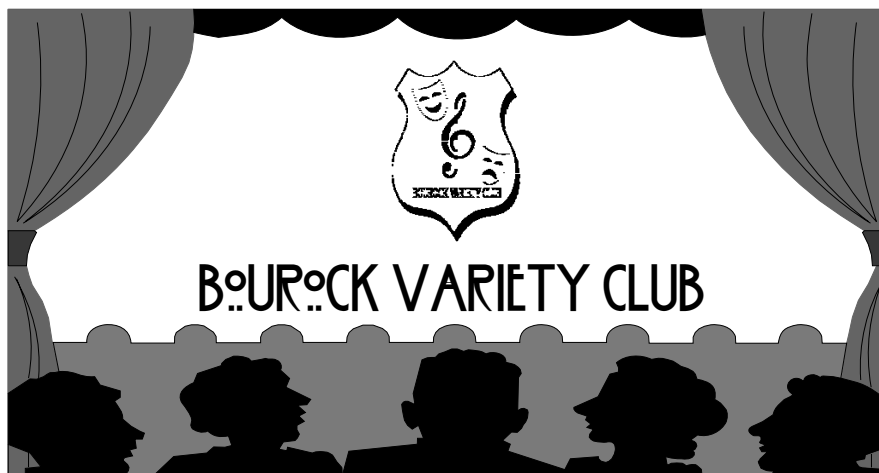

Anchor Boys

The new session started on September 4 2002. On the first night we had 25 boys, all but one being "old boys" returning from last year. Since then, our numbers have risen to 38 with an average weekly attendance of 30 boys. We have had at least one new boy each week since we started. The boys are energetic, enthusiastic and always raring to go!

The boys are split into 6 teams. This year, to encourage positive behaviour, we have introduced a points system. Each team starts the night with 50 points. One point is deducted each time a team member displays any negative behaviour eg fighting, not obeying instructions etc. Equally, points are awarded for good behaviour. The team with most points at the end of the evening is the winning team and each member gets a prize (usually a lollipop or sweet). Competition is keen

among the teams and each boy is eager for his team to win. The system is working very well and a minimum number of points are deducted each week. We have a varied programme each week with a mix of big games:- (eg dodgey ball, hockey, and port and starboard) quiet games:- (jigsaws, board games, play dough) and art and craft.

Craft is particularly popular with the boys. So far the boys have made book marks, star clowns, door hangers, name bugs and Hallowe'en crafts. This week we have made a start on the Christmas crafts.

The Hallowe'en party was held on October 30. The boys came along in wonderful costumes and a good time was had by all.

The next event is the pantomime matinee closely followed by the Christmas party.

This year again we have the assistance of 4 boys from the company section who are a great help and very good with the boys.

Our Guide helper Jillian Webb has so far been unable to return. She is missed by all and we hope she will be able to come back in the not too distant future.

At the end of the evening the boys have a short story from the Bible read to them. Some of the boys like to do the reading! This is followed by a short closing service and prayer.

The evening flies by and we do not have time to be bored.

Finance Report

At the end of October our financial position was as follows: Offerings to date were £45,958 giving a weekly average of £1069. This resulted in a deficit against budget of £2300. Hopefully the offerings will increase during November & December thus reducing this deficit.



A considerable sum has again been generated by the Gift Aid scheme. A claim for just over £9000 has been submitted and I must again thank all those who have signed Declarations which have allowed the church to claim this tax refund against their offerings. We currently have 131 Gift aid Declarations in force but I feel that this

total can be increased further. If you wish to use this simple method of increasing the value of your offerings to the church or if you wish any information, please contact Heather Boklach, the Gift aid Co-ordinator or any member of the Finance Committee.

John McGarrie has given me a report on the Weekly Freewill offering scheme and has brought to my attention the fact that some members of the WFO scheme have, so far this year, made no offerings to the church by means of their envelopes. If you wish to discontinue your envelopes, change from envelopes to Standing Order payment or require any other information on the WFO scheme please speak to John McGarrie.

I have received a letter from The Boys' Brigade, Scottish Headquarters inviting contributions to the Carronvale Development Project in order to improve & increase the facilities available at the Brigade's National Training & Conference Centre at Carronvale House, Larbert. The Board has agreed to support this appeal with a donation from church funds but I would like to bring this to the attention of any former members of the Boys' Brigade and invite them to lend their personal support to this project. John Laird

It was with great sadness that we learned of the death of John Laird on 7 June 2002. John had been ill for some time before his death and had been in the care of both the accord hospice and the Royal Alexandria Hospital.

John had been a member of Bourrock for over 50 years and served as an elder for 40 of these years. A regular and faithful attender at worship, John was an assiduous district elder who took a real interest in his people.

Born in Barrhead - one of a family of eight - with five sisters and two brothers, John spent his life in the town. He worked in Shanks engineering department and then in the pottery. It must have been a blow to be made redundant after 41 years service but John didn't just sit back, he found a job as a porter in the RAH.

John was a member of Arthurlie Bowling Club and enjoyed the camaraderie that it brought. He also enjoyed playing indoors at Paisley Indoor Bowling club.

John had a great love for and a gift for growing plants and spent many happy hours in his greenhouse. I am sure many here will have benefited from this expertise and gardens around Barrhead bear testimony to his skills. The church too benefited in different ways.

John was a member of the men's club in the church and he also used his gardening skills in cutting the manse grass when the manse was located in Lowndes Street.

John married Mima in 1947 and they had one daughter Elizabeth who, of course, is our session clerk. Sadly Mima died in 1981 and after her death John spent some time each day with Elizabeth and her husband Robert and their two daughters, Lorna and Morag. John was very much part of the family at Boylestone Road.

Essentially a quiet man, John was very much a Christian gentleman who never let anyone down. I know that some of you will have personal reasons to be grateful to John for his interest and encouragement. John too had his own brand of humour and it never deserted him - the staff in the hospice always knew that John would have a humorous comment for them.

It is said that the church is the one organisation that never loses a member by death. Instead, they are promoted to the church triumphant - that assembly of wise and wonderful people whose names we only dimly remember.

John has indeed been promoted.

Where nobody interferes with the basic rights of others.

Where new areas of interest can be explored.

Where people are recognised as unique individuals with the right to do things their own way without having other people's values imposed.

Where it is OK to make mistakes and get things wrong.

Where liking, respecting and accepting yourself is seen as the first step in liking, respecting and accepting others.

Where being good to yourself is not seen as being selfish.

Where the 'here' and 'now' is important.
